Tax Relief for American Families and Workers Act of 2024

- \$78 billion legislation passed out of the House on January 31 in an overwhelmingly bipartisan 357 70 vote
 - Passed the House Ways and Means Committee on January 19 by a 40 – 3 vote
- Core components:
 - Child Tax Credit
 - Business tax extenders (R&D and others)
 - Includes extension of 100% bonus depreciation
 - Paid for by repeal of employee retention credit
- Only very limited provisions added to initial core components: disaster tax relief, provisions related to Taiwan, and affordable housing
- Legislation is currently stuck in the Senate

Tax Relief for American Families and Workers Act of 2024

- Housing Credit provisions
 - Restores the 12.5% allocation increase for 2023 –
 2025
 - This allocation increase was initially enacted in 2018 but expired in 2021
 - Would not extend the 12.5% retroactively for 2022, but would restore it retroactively for 2023 and keep it in place for the next two years
 - Would finance 16,263 more affordable homes
 - Lowers the 50% bond financing test to 30% for PAB allocations made in 2024 – 2025
 - Would finance 186,310 more affordable homes



Immediate Next Steps: Senate


- Advocacy focus on the Senate: Republicans and Democrats
 - Republican Senators: urge them to voice public support for the Tax Relief for American Families and Workers Act and ask if you can count on their vote for the legislation if it comes to the floor
 - Democratic Senators: urge them to communicate their support to Majority Leader Schumer for bringing the Tax Relief for American Families and Workers Act to the floor
 - It is important that Majority Leader Schumer hears from members of the Democratic conference that bringing this bill to the floor is a priority

Immediate Next Steps: House


- Thank the 357 members who voted for the Tax Relief for American Families and Workers Act
- Keep recruiting new AHCIA co-sponsors
 - Helps to position Housing Credit provisions for advancement in any vehicle
 - The more co-sponsors sign on this year, the more will sign on quickly next year
- Engage with tax team and lay the groundwork for 2025 tax legislation

House AHCIA Cosponsors v. Weeks After Reintroduction






House AHCIA (H.R.3238) Cosponsors by District - May 2024




Senate Republican AHCIA Cosponsors v. Weeks After Reintroduction

2025 Tax Legislation

- "Super Bowl" of tax: 23 provisions from the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act expire in 2025
- More than \$4.4 trillion worth of expiring tax cuts
- Major questions:
 - Who controls Congress and the White House?
 - Pay-fors/offsets?
 - Reconciliation?
 - Timing?

| Major Tax Provision | Cost (Joint Committee on Taxation) |
|------------------------------------|------------------------------------|
| Lower income tax rates | \$2.16 trillion |
| Higher CTC | \$748 billion |
| Higher standard deduction | \$1.25 trillion |
| 199A deduction (for pass-throughs) | \$684 billion |
| 100% bonus depreciation | \$378 billion |
| New Markets Tax Credit | \$6.7 billion |







Election 2024: Senate






- With Manchin (WV) retirement, Rs
 likely only need 1 more seat to flip
 control
- Dems defending 24 vs Rs 10
- Toss-ups:
 - Sherrod Brown (OH)
 - Jon Tester (MT)
 - Jacky Rosen (NV)
- Housing Ally Retirements:
 - Kyrsten Sinema (I-AZ)
 - Debbie Stabenow (D-MI)
 - Ben Cardin (D-MD)
 - Tom Carper (D-DE)



Election 2024: House

- House margins expected to stay narrow
- Down to 22 toss-up seats: 11 Dems/11 Republicans
 - 9 out of 11 toss-up Republicans are AHCIA cosponsors
- Democrats need 4
 additional seats to flip
 control
- Though slight Republican lead now, Dems leading Republicans in \$\$



Regulatory Issues

HUD Income Limits

HUD released new income limits April 1 with 10% cap on income limit increases

Community Reinvestment Act (CRA)

- Judge has issued an injunction halting implementation of the new CRA regulations issued in October 2023
- Prior CRA regulations remain in effect

Insurance costs

HUD and FHFA looking at actions to help address skyrocketing insurance costs
